Learners brainstorm to identify the leaders of the 1966 Military Coup.</div></div><div><div>Military regimes are generally independent from special interests and have no allegiance to any particular social class, as the military is its own institution with competing interests among its members. Military dictators have no unifying ideology, and they may enforce left-wing politics or right-wing politics.</div><div>1966 Military Coup Leaders of the established coup, including army officers Colonel E.K. 		<p>General J.W.K. Harlley, justified their takeover by charging that the CPP administration was abusive and corrupt.</p> <p>The National Liberation Council (NLC) led the Ghanaian government from 24 February 1966 to 1 October 1969. The body emerged from a coup d'état against the Nkrumah government carried out jointly by the Ghana Police Service and Ghana Armed Forces with collaboration from the Ghana Civil Service.</p>

Read an account on the civilian authority governance under the Second Republic in October 1969. 3. Assist learners to identify reasons why the second republic was overthrown. <p>The 2nd Republic of Ghana;</p> <p>Ghana's government returned to civilian authority under the Second Republic in October 1969 after a parliamentary election in which the Progress Party, led by Kofi A. Busia, won 105 of the 140 seats. Until mid-1970, the powers of the chief of state were held by a presidential commission led by Brigadier A.A. Afrifa.</p> <p>Ghana's Second Republic Constitution was drafted in January 1968. The Constitution holds the view that the traditional separations of power are outdated and it is the job of the President to preserve the independence of institutions. The executive is independent from the legislative and judiciary branches of government. The Second Republic Constitution used a decentralized form of government, where the local administrations served as extensions to the central government, which set the local administration's prerogative</p> <p>The Prime Minister of the Second Republic of Ghana;</p> <p>Kofi Abrefa Busia (born 11 July 1913 – 28 August 1978) was a Ghanaian political leader and academic who was Prime Minister of Ghana from 1969 to 1972.</p>	<p>Learners brainstorm to compare the first republic to the second republic.</p> <p>Exercise;</p> <p>State 4 reasons why the second republic was overthrown.</p>
