		Informal language is a style of speech and writing used when addressing someone we know or someone we would like to get to know. Informal language is used in conversations with	
		friends, family, classmates and colleagues.	
		difference between informal and formal register;	
		<ul> <li>Formal language is less personal than informal language. It is used when writing for professional or academic purposes like university assignments.</li> <li>Formal language does not use colloquialisms, contractions or first person pronouns such as 'I' or 'We'. Informal language is more casual and spontaneous.</li> </ul>	
		Example; Informal: I'm so sorry to hear that! I hope your dog gets well soon! Have you taken him to the vet yet? If you need any help with that or with anything else, just let me know, okay?	
		<b>Formal</b> : This is bad news indeed. I was told that in such dire circumstances, a pet must be taken to a veterinary clinic. Would you consider doing this? Should you need assistance, do not hesitate to contact me

The first part tells us what kind of object or person it is, or what its purpose is. The second part identifies the object or person in question. Compound nouns often have a meaning that is different, or more specific, than the two separate words.
