MONDAY	<p>Show Video and Pictures of a Puberty Rite performed in the Learners community.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Bragoro of the Akan Dipo of the Krobo Baala of Sissala Sodji-wi of the Chala 	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> Learners brainstorm to identify activities performed during Puberty rite in their Community. Learners to role play how puberty rites are performed in their community. <p>Activities Performed during Bragoro;</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ✓ The first activity of the day is enstoolment which is performed by an old woman who has many children ✓ The initiate is placed on a stool three times remaining on the stool the third time. ✓ The stool is usually placed on a mat covered with a blanket or kente cloth. ✓ A brass basin called Yaawa is filled with water containing Adwera or Odwen-Ahaban (leaves of Odwen) with an egg and a dry okro fruit is placed beside the girl. ✓ According to Nana Gyamfua, the Obaapanyin or Queen mother of Woarakose, a woman sits beside the Yaawa and when gifts in the form of coins are put in the Yaawa, she sprinkles water with the adwera or odwen on the girl. <p>“the sprinkling of this water will protect her from evil spirits that may make her barren. Women sing and move around the girl”.</p> <p>Activities performed during Dipo;</p>			<p>Reflect on activities performed during Puberty rite in Learners Community.</p> <p>Exercise;</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> Describe how Dipo is performed. Describe how Bragoro is performed.

		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ✓ On the first day of the rites, the girls have their heads shaved and dressed with cloth around their waist to just their knee level. This is done by a special ritual mother and it signifies their transition from childhood to adulthood. ✓ They are paraded to the entire community as the initiates (dipo-yo). ✓ They are taught the Klama dance, undergo a ritual bath and the crux of the rite is when the girls are made to sit on a stone which is believed determines virginity ✓ Any girl who is found not to be a virgin at the time of the rites used to be ostracized in the past and was treated as an outcast.
